James B. Hartman, a resident of Kansas City, Mo. is hereby ordered to remove from this District, the State of Missouri and the state of Kansas, within ten days from the date hereof.

He will not return to this District, the State of Missouri, nor the state of Kansas during the Rebellion without previous express permission from competent Military authority.

He will leave the City of Kansas, within twenty four hours from this time, not to return again, except as above prescribed.

St. Joseph, Mo., Aug 27th, 1864.

Joseph Spencer being first duly sworn deposes and says, I reside in Buchanan Co. Mo. 10 miles South of St. Joseph Mo. I am at present a prisoner in the Mil. Prison at St. Joseph Mo. I know a man in jail by the name of James Brown Hartman I know him formerly while he lived in Kansas. He came over to Platte Co. with some negroes for the purpose as he told me of taking some property from there

I have heard him say if he ever got out of jail he intended to shoot Col. Bassett, Major Porter and Lieut Harding. He said in my presence yesterday evening that Genl. Fisk was a damned Dutch Son-of-a-bitch, and said he thought he would get out in a week or two when he intended to shoot him I have heard him make these threats

St. Joseph, Mo., Aug 12th, 1864.

Orton J. Warren being duly sworn deposes and says. I reside in Clay Co. Mo. I at present confined a prisoner in the jail at St Joseph Mo. A prisoner confined in the jail who calls himself James Brown Hartman a few days since the said ~~Hartman~~ said in my presence that as soon as he got out of jail he would take the life of Major Porter Judge Advocate of the Commission which tried Henry ^J Inman and would also kill General Clinton B. Fisk and Col J. M. Bussitt Provost. Marshal and said further that he would have revenge out of the whole damned Commission. (meaning the Commission that tried his partner Inman) I have heard him make these threats repeatedly and it seemed to be his settled determination to kill the three persons named, Major Porter, General Fisk and Col Bussitt

He made these threats in consequence of
the action of the officers named in
bringing Freeman to trial. After Freeman
was taken from the jail and sent to St. Louis
he seemed to think and expressed the belief
that he would be forcibly rescued from
the jail by the friends of Freeman.

I have heard Freeman make similar
threats but he was more prudent and
careful in expressing them.

Wartman also said on one occasion
that there were two men confined there
in jail whose lives he would take at
the first opportunity but he did not
name them
