STATISTICS

of Wayne County Churches Listed in the Historical Atlas of Iowa, pub. 1875

"This is all denominations. There were 50 organizations with seven denominations, - Baptists 12, -Christian 4, - Congregational 1, - United Brethern 4, - Catholic 1, - Presbyterian 3, - Methodists 25. Edifices 15."

From that time until 1963 we find there have been 85 churches with 16 different denominations. Thirty-seven churches have gone out of existence, leaving 48 churches with only eleven denominations which are active and hold services, each in its own church.

To-day there are 12 Methodist, 11 Christian, 9 Baptist, 4 Assembly of God, 2 United Brethren, 1 Latter Day Saints, 1 Presbyterian, 1 Bible Church, 1 Jehovah Witness, 1 Nazarene, 1 Pentecostal and 4 are Non-denominational.

Sixty-one people have written Histories and several others furnished bits of information. Fourteen Photographers have taken pictures and there are several pictures by unknown photographers. Four Poets have fitting poems included to make reading more interesting.

FIRST CHURCH MEETING IN

WAYNE COUNTY

The first religious services ever held in Wayne county, Iowa, so far as can be learned with any certainty, were held by Rev. Joseph Sullivan, at the home of his son, H.P. Sullivan, who lived about one and one-half miles east of the present town of Lineville, Iowa, early in December 1840.

Rev. Sullivan was a Methodist minister who was born in Kentucky Dec. 15, 1792. His wife was Narcissy Duncan, sister of H.P. Duncan, who later came to Iowa. Rev. Sullivan arrived at the home of his son on Nov. 4, 1840. After a month here he made arrangements for the meetings to be held at his son's home. Rev. Sullivan attended and assisted at nearly all the meetings in that vicinity. Those trips were, of course on horseback, and "Riding the Circuit" had its difficulties as at that time in 1840 there were no bridges in the country and no regular roads as we know them, just trails. Rain storms made it necessary to swim the streams, and severe winter blizzards were equally troublesome. Yet in spite of all these drawbacks, they persisted and much credit should be and is given to these early ministers.
