"On Feb. 27, 1877, Milton Courtright of Erie Pennsylvania, deeded to W.C. Duncan, J. Beham, George Dean, Peter Martin and C.R. Wright, trustees, Lot 12, Block 33 in the town of Allerton, Ia, consideration the sum of \$1.00." Located corner of Niagara and Oak Streets.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, pioneer church of Allerton, was built in the summer of 1874. It was a frame structure, and it was rebuilt in 1880. The early membership was very small. In 1886 there were 115 members.

The early pastors were; G.W. Patterson, - Hayes, - J.H. Miller, - J.R. Horswell, - G.C. Waynick, - and W.J. Beck. Rev. R.W. Matheny was the pastor in 1886, and James Bracewell was Sunday School Supt.

The Rev. Miss Alta Nichols, was pastor of the church for six years. She was one of the first licensed "women preachers" of the Methodist church when women were ordained to the ministry in 1919. The Methodist board, controlled by men, of course, decided that women could be accepted in the ministry, and she has been in the pulpit ever since and has won the respect and admiration of the clergymen for the fine performance of duty and service.

The lady preacher chuckled when Herb Owens of the Des Moines Register and Tribune asked her if she preached "hell fire and brimstone" sermons. Her reply was, You just have to show people the highest plane for proper living. She did much evangelistic work in Iowa, a number of years before she was ordained.

In 1969 the Allerton Methodist Church united with other churches and is now known as Allerton United Methodist Church.
